# K-State run derails MU

Compiled from AP reports

Steve Henson and Jean Derouillere triggered an 18-2 run late in the second half Thursday night that carried Kansas State to a 65-58 victory over ice-cold No. 1 Missouri.

A wild scene engulfed the floor at the end of the game with students pouring out of the stands and attempting to carry players and coaches away. School and security officials needed several minutes to clear the floor.

Missouri (21-2 overall, 7-1 in the Big Eight), which had a 12-game winning streak and had sat atop the poll three weeks, led 47-39 when Derouillere's bucket ignited the winning spree. Derouillere scored eight points in the stretch and Henson had six, including a 3-pointer that put the Wildcats (13-10, 3-4) on top 50-49 with 5:35 remaining, their first lead since 6-5.

Missouri, whose only previous loss was to Illinois in December, made only one bucket, a tip-in by Doug Smith, in almost nine minutes. The Tigers shot a season-low 29 percent.

Askia Jones blocked a Missouri shot following Henson's go-ahead bucket and then made a pair of free throws when Missouri's Anthony Peeler committed his third foul.

Henson, who scored all his 18 points in the second half, rebounded another Missouri miss a moment later and fed Jones inside for a 54-49 lead. Henson then rebounded Trevor Ford's long miss, got fouled and sank a free throw.

Missouri, which led by as many as eight early in the second half, got within four points at 57-53 on Smith's two free throws. But Henson's 12-footer made it 59-53 with 1:03 left.

Peeler led the Tigers with 18 points and was 8-for-8 from the free throw line, while Smith had 13.

Derouillere had 24 to lead the Wildcats.

**Louisville 95, S. Carolina 77**  
Jerome Harmon scored 19 points to lead six players in double figures as No. 15 Louisville used a 13-1 run in a 2:13 span of the first half to beat South Carolina.

Louisville (18-4, 8-1 in the Metro Conference) made 34 of 61 shots from the field for 56 percent and forced South Carolina (10-9, 4-4) into 26 turnovers, resulting in 37 points.

Louisville led 46-35 at halftime and scored the first nine points of the second half.

Senior guard Eric Sykes scored 22 of his career-high 30 points in the first half to keep South Carolina, which shot 71 percent (15 of 21) from

the field in the half, close.

**Michigan 79, Indiana 71**

Loy Vaught led a balanced scoring attack with 19 points as No. 7 Michigan broke a three-game losing streak against No. 25 Indiana.

The Wolverines (17-4, 7-3) had lost the earlier Big Ten Conference meeting this season 69-67 after holding a 20-point lead in the first half.

Thursday night, the Wolverines again jumped to a big early lead, 28-16 with 8:41 left in the first half, and failed to hold it as Indiana (14-6, 4-6) took a 33-31 halftime lead.

After falling behind by as much as 43-36 early in the second half, the Wolverines took control for good with a 12-4 run for a 70-59 lead with 5:31 to play.

Eric Anderson and Chris Lawson led Indiana with 20 points each as the two were unstoppable down low.

**Michigan St. 60, Wisconsin 57**

Kirk Manns scored 19 points, including a key basket with 18 seconds to go, to help No. 23 Michigan State hold off Wisconsin.

Wisconsin had two chances to tie in the final five seconds, but 3-point shots by Brian Good and Larry Hisle both bounced off the rim.

The victory was the 232nd for Jud Heathcote at Michigan State, tying him with Ben VanAlstyne for the most coaching wins at the school.

**Illinois 99, Minnesota 72**

Marcus Liberty scored a career-high 33 points and Kendall Gill added 26 to lead 12th-ranked Illinois to a Big Ten victory over No. 16 Minnesota.

Minnesota coach Clem Haskins complained bitterly to referees about what he thought was a lack of foul-calling, and he drew two technical fouls in a 13-second span in the first half.

The Illini (17-4 overall and 7-4 in the league), who held a 44-36 halftime lead, blew the game open with a 12-2 run to go ahead 56-40 to start the second half.

The Gophers (15-5, 6-4) were led by Willie Burton's 26 points.


**Xavier 83, Marquette 78**

Jamal Walker scored 14 of his 22 points in the final five minutes to rally No. 21 Xavier of Ohio from a four-point deficit to avictory over Marquette.

Xavier (19-2 overall and 8-1 in the Midwestern Collegiate Conference) trailed most of the second half, falling behind by six points with six minutes left.

Tony Smith had 31 points for Marquette, but fouled out with 38 seconds remaining.

## Mizzou recruits claim immunity

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) — Two former Missouri recruits say they have been granted limited immunity to testify against the country's No. 1-ranked basketball team for alleged rules violations.

P.J. Mays, who attended Missouri briefly in 1988, and Daniel Lyton, who attended Missouri briefly last summer, told the Atlanta Journal-Constitution that they had agreed to testify under condition of limited immunity.

Neither the NCAA nor the university would comment on the investigation. Lyton announced last summer that he would not attend Missouri because he was afraid the school would be placed on probation by the NCAA. He later enrolled for about a month before withdrawing.

Lyton confirmed in a telephone interview with the Columbia Tribune Thursday that he had been granted limited immunity by the NCAA. "Yeah, they suggested it," he said.

"If Missouri goes on probation, I'm free to go to whatever school immediately and I won't have to sit out," he said.

Lyton told the Columbia newspaper that he told the NCAA that Vic Adams, an alleged Detroit talent scout, had picked up his letter of intent and delivered it to Missouri in violation of NCAA rules.

Mays, who is attending Anderson (S.C.) Junior College, told the Atlanta Journal-Constitution that "they said something to the effect that just so long as I tell the truth, I can't be harmed."

Bob Sundvold, an assistant basketball coach at Missouri, allegedly violated NCAA rules by purchasing airline tickets for Mays. In a Nov. 16, 1988, conversation taped by Mays' mother, Sundvold reportedly admitted that he bought the tickets and asked Mrs. Mays to tell an athletic department official that there was a misunderstanding about who had purchased the ticket.

Sundvold was suspended part of last season but was reinstated after a university investigation.

David Berst, the NCAA's assistant executive director for enforcement, refused to discuss the investigation into Missouri's basketball program or the reported offer of limited immunity for Lyton and Mays.

Missouri coach Norm Stewart and athletic director Dick Tamburo did not return calls to The Associated Press Thursday.

# Glendale, 17-3, calls on Eagles

The Joplin High School boys basketball team renews its rivalry tonight with a team which has handed out a ton of misery to the Eagles in recent seasons.

Ozark Conference-leading Glendale visits with the program opening with the junior varsity game at 6:30 in Kaminsky Gymnasium.

Glendale is 8-1 against Joplin since Memorial and Parkwood merged for the 1985-86 campaign. Two of the losses came in the first round of the Missouri Class 4A Tournament. The Falcons, shut out the first period last season in Joplin, recovered to prevail in the league.

Glendale, a 57-36 winner against the Eagles in Springfield on Dec. 19, leads the Ozark Conference this season with a 6-1 record and is 17-3 overall. Joplin is 4-3, 13-8.

Joplin, with 6-foot-6 senior Steve Davis scoring 44 points, presented Phil Lewis his 200th coaching victory last Tuesday with an 81-71 non-league win at Neosho.

Davis, who hit 13 of 18 shots from the field (including five of eight treys), embellished his performance against Neosho with 12 rebounds and eight assists. The spree boosted his averages to 21.8 points and seven rebounds.

"I just found out about those 44 points today," Glendale coach Mike Keltner said Thursday. "That's good because Davis will cause me to have only one sleepless night. It sounds like Joplin really is playing well."

But it wasn't that way in the first meeting this season.

"We did not get off to a good start," Lewis said. "It was 11-2 at the end of the first quarter and I think it was 17-2 before we were involved at all."

"I'm not sure Glendale has a weakness," Lewis said. "Their intensity level always is high. They play great defense and they're good shooters."

"There's no question we're capable of playing with them," Lewis said. "We've come a long way since the first game. We've cut our turnovers and improved our shooting. 'But we have to match their intensity level on defense,'" Lewis said. "Our defense has to be as sticky and tough. We have to be

patient on offense and take the high percentage shots. We need our best game — an effort equal to the one at Parkview (when the Eagles won 52-50 in overtime)."

Miles Thompson, a 6-5 senior, is averaging approximately 14 points and 10 rebounds to head a balanced Glendale attack.

Expected to complete the starting lineup, Keltner said, are 6-4 senior Dirk Price and a trio of juniors — 6-4 Mike Nelson, 6-3 Mat Twiehaus and 6-0 Michael McClain. Mark January, a 6-2 junior, is averaging 10 points in reserve.

Lewis plans to counter with Davis, 5-11 junior Sean McClain, 6-1 junior Scott Thomas, 6-3 sophomore Jason Giebler and 6-5 junior Roger Doman or 6-2 sophomore Mike Caruthers.

"We know Giebler and others have progressed during the season," Keltner said.

"We're playing OK," Keltner added. "We could have played better against Parkview (a 50-44 loss last Friday), but we were OK until the last few minutes when we missed some easy shots and free throws."

The win against Neosho gave Lewis, 39, a career log of 200-138. He's in his eighth season at Joplin, including three at Memorial, after five years in central Illinois at Bushnell-Prairie City and Wenona. He has degrees from the University of Dubuque (Iowa) and Pittsburg State.

## Lady Norse jolt Connors in OT

MIAMI, Okla. — Northeastern Oklahoma A&M rallied from a late seven-point deficit to shock the No. 1-ranked Connors State women 60-57 in an overtime women's junior college basketball game Thursday night.

Anissa Booker, 6-foot-1 freshman from Hamilton, Ohio, scored 19 points, including six in a late 8-0 NEO run, to spark the victory. The Norsewomen improved their record to 20-3 overall and 5-0 in the Bi-State East Division.

Connors State, which was elevat-

ed to the No. 1 ranking in the latest NJCAA poll, fell to 21-2 and 4-1.

The visiting Cowgirls led 52-45 before NEO rattled off eight straight points, the first six by Booker. A basket by Sylvia Cummings put NEO ahead 53-52 with 39 seconds left.

Vickie Jones hit a single free throw with 19 seconds left to tie the game, but missed two shots at 0:05.

Booker hit two free throws and Cummings added a short jumper as NEO jumped ahead early in overtime. Booker's basket in the closing seconds iced the upset.

## Diamond McAuley's homecoming rival

McAuley Regional, attempting to bounce back from a 24-point loss to Diamond last Saturday, stages its homecoming tonight. The opponent? Diamond.

It's obvious, therefore, that coach Don Colbert's preparation of the Warriors has been as much mental as physical.

"It's always tough to come back and play a team (like Diamond) again," Colbert said. "The positive thing we have going for us is we're at home."

"We've had two good practices. Wednesday and Thursday went real well, as far as could be expected when you're getting ready for homecoming. Our morale is up and morale serves as a catalyst to our success."

Tonight's program tips off at 6:30 with the junior varsity game. The homecoming queen will be crowned between games.

Diamond enters with record of 16-6 overall and 6-1 in the Ozark 6 Conference. The Wildcats' one-point loss to East Newton on Tuesday ended a 10-game losing streak.

McAuley is 9-13 and 3-4. Dustin Burkley, Diamond's scoring

leader, attended Thursday night's girls game on crutches.

But Colbert ordered his players to forget about Burkley's chances of playing tonight.

"I told our players they will probably throw those crutches away and be ready to jump high tomorrow," Colbert said. "We want to be ready with our own game plan. If he doesn't play, that's Diamond's problem."

"We have our own injury problems. Ryan Griesemer has a jammed finger, Jason Lowe a pulled groin, Brian Stearnes a bad knee. I can go on and on. That's a part of it. This late in the season, you just hope they can shake through it and be ready for the games."

Colbert will select a starting lineup from among six players for the Warriors' final home game: seniors Lowe, Jack Soetaert and Mike Nelson, plus juniors Griesemer, Brett Hergenrother and Steve Parrigon.

A more immediate concern than the injuries, said Colbert, is the Warriors' mental approach at the end of the game.

"We've had some games slip away in the fourth quarter. It's become a mental thing and it's working on some of the players," he said.

Joplin, piling up a 26-5 lead by halftime, crushed Central 54-26 in Springfield Thursday night to remain unbeaten in Ozark Conference girls prep basketball.

The Lady Eagles, 19-2 overall, go for their eighth league win Tuesday night at Springfield Kickapoo. The Lady Bulldogs, who had lost only 42-39

in the earlier league game in Joplin, fell to 1-6, 7-13.

"We didn't shoot that well," Joplin coach Sandy Shelley said, "but we played great defensively and rebounding. We did a good job with our press."

Joplin charts had the Lady Eagles with a 37-18 advantage in rebounds.

Joplin received double-figure scoring from three players — 5-foot-8 senior Tina Robbins with 16, 5-11 junior Becka Sloan 14 and 5-6 junior Kristin Mayberry 10.

Robbins added 10 rebounds, Sloan nine and 5-11 junior Shelle Riley eight. Robbins had seven assists.

Central all-leaguer Michelle Dixon scored only 11 points after collecting 25 in the earlier meeting. "We worked hard trying to stop Dixon," Shelley said. "We focused on her with our 2-3 zone."

Joplin B cruised 50-11 behind Staci Tignor's 19 points and six rebounds, Kristi Houston's 10 points, Erin Hicklin's five assists and five steals, and Tonya Mutz' five steals.

**Diamond 47, McAuley 37**
